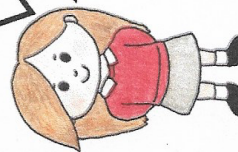


We've learned about nouns in English. Does French have nouns too?

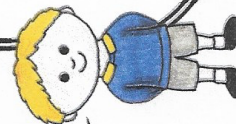


Yes! There are nouns in French too. For example, *chat* is cat, *fleur* is flower and *poires* are pears.

In the box there are some French cognates. Cognates are words that English and French share. They look the same or similar; and they mean the same.


I've heard that French has two groups of nouns. Is that true?




Yes, that's right, James!
The two groups are called **masculine** and **feminine**.




If we describe something as **masculine**, it has something to do with being or looking male.




Yes.




So if we describe something as **feminine**, it has something to do with being or looking female?




Yes.




Male people and animal words are **masculine**, female people and animal words are **feminine**.




In French, though, every noun is **masculine** or **feminine**, not just the people and animals. For example, a table is feminine.




But a table isn't a girl!



You're right! It belongs to the group of nouns called **feminine**, which also contains the female people words and animal words.



'Masculine' and 'feminine' are just labels for the two groups. They could be called 'A words' and 'B words', for example.



It's important to know which group a word belongs to, as the two groups use different determiners and different forms of many adjectives.






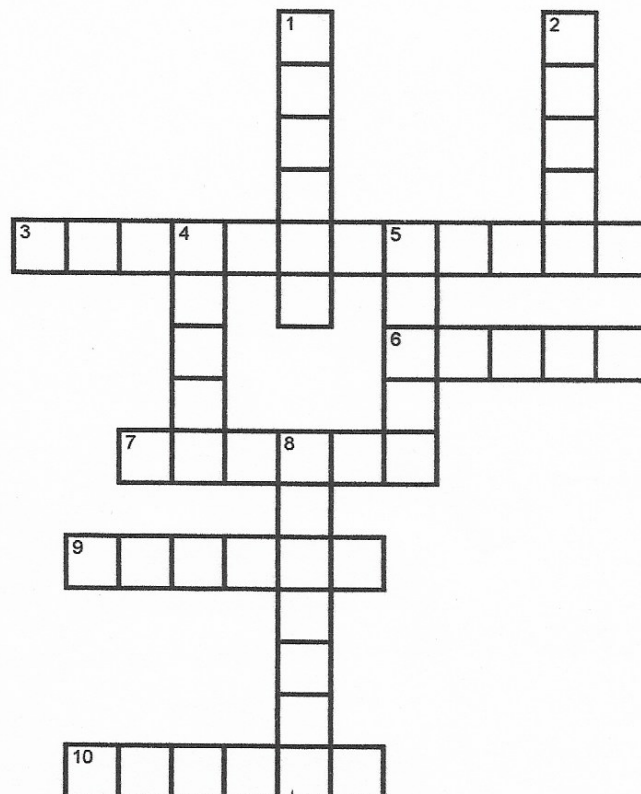
