Emails:

You should email your child's teacher directly regarding any concerns you have regarding homework, friendships etc. Class teachers will aim to get back to you within two working days, however, please also be aware that not all of our teachers are full-time. General 2

Toys in School:

We would like to remind all families that children should not bring toys or Pokémon cards to school. During the summer term we noticed an increase in children bringing toys and cards from home, which has unfortunately caused some issues. When items are lost or broken, it can cause significant distress to the children involved.

Punctuality:

Please ensure your child arrives and is collected on time each day. Key Stage 1 children should arrive between 8:30–8:45am and Key Stage 2 between 8:45–8:55am. Collection times are 3:00pm for Key Stage 1 and 3:15pm for Key Stage 2.

Late arrivals can disrupt lessons and cause children to feel unsettled at the start of the day. Similarly, late collections impact staff workload and create unnecessary stress for children waiting to be picked up. If you are late picking up your child, they will be taken to Falcons and you may be charged.



First Aid Reporting

- Any first aid treatments (including prescribed medicines and inhaler usage) that the children receive at school will be reported to parents* via our Smart log email system (notifications@sl.safesmart.co.uk)
- Please note that there is no need to call the school should you receive an email informing you that your child has had an accident. If your child has had an accident where we believe a parent should be given more details over the phone or picked up from school, the school will call you.
- Should your child's accident involve a head bump, they will be given a head bump sticker.



Uniform

At Frieth, we believe that the school uniform contributes to our school ethos and instils a sense of belonging to the school. We ask the children to take pride in their appearance and to look smart in school.

Homework expectations

- Please ensure your child is reading daily at home and the reading record is filled in every day: date, title, pages read and any comments.
- It is expected that homework is always completed and handed in on time (Mondays), except in special circumstances.
- If children are having some difficulties with homework, we will be more than happy to go over it again with them.
- If there is a reason homework couldn't be completed, please email the teacher and make them aware.

Reading at home

- Daily reading at home is essential at this age the more often the better.
- It is good practice to read the same book 2 or 3 times.
- Ask lots of questions about the book it helps with the comprehension.
- Children read to the teacher/LSA/Reading Volunteers every day in school.

Homework - Maths Passports

- We will continue to work on the maths passports on a regular basis in school.
- Where possible, please also continue to support your child at home by making sure they are secure and confident in their mental arithmetic knowledge.



Homework – Spelling Stars

- The children have already completed this half term's baseline assessment of their Spelling Star.
- They will be bringing home a copy this week, with the words that they need to practise highlighted in yellow.
- Children will be retested on their Spelling Star at the end of each half term.
- Please support your child in making sure that they are practising these words in addition to their other homework.



Class communication box

- It is very important that the children feel they can talk to their teachers if they have a worry. If they feel they can not approach directly, all classes have a 'Communication Box' which the children can place a note in.

PSHE 1

At Frieth school PSHE is a taught subject. PSHE is timetabled once a week and delivered by class teachers. The PSHE curriculum has been designed to help pupils develop their knowledge and skills over time, embedding learning to ensure pupils receive a relevant and age- appropriate education to support them in their lives now and in the future.

PSHE is taught in units and the themes are available to view on the school website. There are 3 core themes:

- Core theme 1: Relationships— Autumn Term
- Core theme 2: Living in the Wider World Spring Term
- Core theme 3: Health and Well Being Summer Term

PSHE 2

The topic titles within each theme are:

- Relationships Feelings and Emotions, Healthy Relationships, Valuing Difference
- Living in the Wider World Rights and Responsibilities, Environment, Money
- Health and Well Being Healthy lifestyles, Growing and Changing, Keeping Safe

We teach the scientific names of body parts from Year 1 and introduce the following key words through the Christopher Winter and PSHE Association resources:

Year 2 – similar, different, sex, gender roles, stereotypes, boy, girl, male, female, private parts, penis, vulva

Handwriting

Continuous Cursive Style

- helps with spelling
- ideas during writing flow more swiftly
- no need to learn two different styles of handwriting
- provides a directional left-right movement
- lessens the chance of reversing letters
- distinction between upper- and lower-case letters are clearer
- easy to read, good to look at and quick to execute, particularly for children with special needs



KS1 Assessments

- Following the 2017 consultation on primary assessment, end of KS1 assessments are no longer statutory. This took effect from 1 September 2023.
- The following KS1 assessments are now optional:
 - Teacher assessment judgements in English reading, English writing, mathematics and science
 - Tests in English reading and mathematics (the English grammar, punctuation and spelling test will also remain optional)
- The existing frameworks remain available for schools who wish to use them as part of their ongoing assessment of children.

KS1 Assessments

- STA will also continue to develop and supply materials for the optional, non-statutory end of KS1 tests in:
 - English reading
 - English grammar, punctuation and spelling
 - Mathematics
- The optional tests will support schools in the measurement of pupil achievement and to help identify where their pupils need additional support as they transition into KS2.

Writing at home

- Encourage a love of writing.
- Encourage a variety of different forms of writing e.g. lists, cards, messages, reminders, books, stories, poems, instructions.
- Use fun writing equipment and resources.
- Encourage a quiet writing time everyday so it becomes a habit.
- Be good role models. Does your child see other people write at home?



Strategies for helping your child with their writing 1

- Model writing at home. Let your child see you write for a purpose (male role models for boys!).
- Talk about your writing what are you doing and why. Talk through some of your decision making, such as what to write, choice of word, order. Continually re-read the writing to provide a good model for when your child writes.
- Choose a good time to write and make sure the environment is right. It shouldn't be a chore, but a nice experience for you to do together.



Strategies for helping your child with their writing 2

- Help your child include high frequency words which they know in their writing.
- Encourage your child to use their phonic knowledge to write words and make attempts at more complex words.
- Help them to be aware of punctuation and use it in their writing.
- Make sure the writing is 'purposeful' e.g. a list, message, reminder, card, instructions, postcard.
- Write together on a daily basis. Little and often is the key.



Strategies for helping your child with their writing 3

- Allow times for the child to write on their own.
- Give them plenty of praise and encouragement.
- Sometimes act as a scribe for your child. After they say the sentence, repeat it. Say each word as you write it.
- Encourage and support your child in writing about subjects they are interested in.
- When sharing your child's writing, try and focus on the positives and mention one area for improvement.
- Encourage your child to share their home writing with us in school.
