Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Our intention is that all pupils, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face, make good progress and achieve high attainment across all subject areas. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal, including progress for those who are already high attainers.

Objectives in spending PPG:

- To ensure the learning needs of all pupil premium pupils are being addressed through daily intervention and quality first support within classroom teaching and that emotional support is available where necessary.
- To provide daily feedback for pupil premium pupils, to ensure they are making at least good progress in reading, writing and maths. This has been identified by the Education Endowment Foundation as a low-cost but highly effective strategy for supporting pupil premium pupils and is based on extensive research.
- To provide ongoing emotional support for vulnerable pupils with an ELSA on site at all times.
- To continue to provide high-quality reading materials for disadvantaged pupils to keep in their homes.
- To enable disadvantaged children to attend school trips.
- To enable disadvantaged pupils to participate in before and after school clubs and wrap-around care.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

1	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils indicate underdeveloped oral language skills and vocabulary gaps among some of our disadvantaged pupils.
2	Data indicates that three pupils are currently working below the expected standard in maths.
3	Data indicates that two pupils are below the expected standard in reading.
4	Data indicates that five pupils are below the expected standard in writing.
5	Data indicates that two pupils are below the expected standard in reading, writing and maths.

6	Our assessments, observations and discussions with pupils and families have identified social and emotional issues for many pupils. These challenges particularly affect disadvantaged pupils, including their attainment.
	Teacher referrals for ELSA support continue to be high. Two PP pupils currently require additional support with social and emotional needs through attendance at small group or 1:1 ELSA sessions.

Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2023 to 2024 academic year.

Evaluation of the 2024-2025 Intended Outcome Success Criteria:

- 1. To ensure the learning needs of all pupil premium pupils are being addressed through daily intervention and quality first support within the classroom teaching and emotional support is available where necessary.
 - The majority of pupil premium pupils made progress in reading, writing, and maths, with some achieving accelerated progress. Children achieving below expected levels continue to be a key focus for the current year.
 - Some pupils have been identified as working below the expected standard in reading, writing and maths and reducing this gap will be a focus for academic year 2025-2026.
- 2. Pupil A will be working at the expected standard in reading, writing and maths by July 2025.
 - Pupil A has been able to access the relevant year group curriculum, however, at the end of the 2024-2025 academic year, they were working towards the expected standard in reading, writing and maths.
 - Pupils B, C, D and E will be working at the expected standard in writing by July 2025.
 - All pupils were below the expected standard in writing at the end of the year. However, Pupils C and D did make expected progress in this area.
 - Pupils D, E and F will be working at expected standard in maths by July 2025. By the end of the academic year, Pupils D and I were at the expected standard for maths.
- 3. To provide ongoing emotional support for vulnerable pupils with an ELSA on site at all times.
 - Two pupil premium pupils have accessed regular ELSA support over the academic year 2024-2025.
- 4. To provide high quality reading material for disadvantaged pupils to keep in their homes
 - All eligible pupils received either the Storytime magazine (EYFS/KS1) or The Week Junior (KS2).
- To enable disadvantaged children to attend school visits.
 All pupils were able to access and attend school visits/school workshops.
- 6. To enable disadvantaged pupils to participate in before and after school clubs.

Subsidised access to wrap-around care continued. Access to after-school clubs, including Kickboxing, Rugby and Gymnastics, continued.
